Sausages and Plums Bake

Ingredients

Serves 2:

- 4 sausages
- 150ml chicken stock
- 2 tblspn maple syrup
- 2 tblspn cider vinegar
- 4-5 plums, halved and pitted
- 1 large red onion, peeled and thickly sliced
- Salt and penner



This dish is so adaptable and perfect as we say goodbye to summer and embrace autumn. I try to keep things local so I used some Korker's sausages that were in the freezer and bought some kentish plums from a local farm shop. I think this would be equally good with vegan or veggie sausages or even venison ones. The cider vinegar could be swapped out for red wine vinegar and, once the plum season has finished, a bramley apple might be a good alternative.

Method

- 1) Brown the sausages in a frying pan and pop into a small casserole dish.
- 2) Use the chicken stock to deglaze the pan, don't forget the crusty brown bits that get stuck to the pan, and then add the maple syrup and vinegar and plenty of seasoning.
- 3) Pour over the sausages and add the plums and the onion to the casserole.
- 4) Put into a preheated oven at 190c, uncovered and cook for 30 minutes until the onions and the sausages are cooked through and the plums are almost melting.

We enjoyed this with buttery mash and plenty of peas!

To sum up this six month period:

- February was the driest month with a total of only 7.5mm.
- March was the wettest month (108.7mm) it rained on 23 of the 31 days and there was snow on
 7 March and 21.5mm of rain on 23 March
- May was rather cloudy and overcast
- June was sunny and hot 30.7° on 10 June hotter than any day in June 2022

NATURE NOTES BY JAN ARMISHAW

It has been an unusual Summer with good weather in May and June followed by a very disappointing July and August and now we really are experiencing an "Indian Summer" with plenty of sunshine.

I have seen several different kinds of butterflies darting about and spreading their wings in the sunshine including the startling Painted lady, Meadow brown, Common blue, Brimstone, Large skipper, Large and Small Whites, Red admiral and the beautiful Marbled white. I expect you might have seen some others as well. Interestingly, some butterflies migrate. Our butterfly immigrants include the Painted lady, the Clouded Yellow, the Red Admiral

and the Large and Small

Whites. The
Painted lady
migrates from
North Africa and a
lepidopterist
observed a large
migratory swarm of
Painted ladies, rising,
rustling, settling

and then rustling again over an area of mountainside in Sardinia. I would love to have seen this. The red Admiral and the Clouded Yellow migrate from the Mediterranean area.

Originally in the 18th century the Red Admiral was called the Red Admirable, but it was changed to Red Admiral possibly because of the Red Admiral of the Red Squadron who flew red colours in the old organisation of the Navy.

Males of quite a few butterflies, have scent patches on their fore wings on the upper side and the scents encourage the females. The strongest scent of any British butterfly comes from the Green veined White. of damp grassland, where its larvae feed on Lady's Smock which has a smell of lemon verbena, I have occasionally seen Green veined White on the fringes of Larkey Valley Woods. The Common Blue shells of chocolate.

I hope you have learnt something new. I certainly have after doing a bit of research.

CAN WE FIX IT? YES WE CAN? BY DAVE SMITH

We sometimes have local issues, with repairs damage etc., in our area that need to be reported to the relevant authority for action. This can be the source of frustration, if it is not done, easily checked for progress and completed. We have had a situation with the street light outside the HCA HALL. This has been out of action for some time. The reasons are not difficult to discover if you read below.

It might be useful to understand how to report faults, and then check their progress, which anyone can do. It might assist in progressing works and lead to some success in getting things done. Though being honest it still needs some effort.

Anyone can report a fault to KCC on line, like potholes, damage street furniture like lights and signs. It is then put onto their backlog work list, decided who will pay for this work, money assigned, and then action it.

So, as test examples, we have reported 2 faults to KCC. The first being the HCA HALL STREET LIGHT and the second being the STREET LIGHT IN NEW HOUSE CLOSE adjacent to No. 28.

If the fault is correctly reported it will go into KCC work log and can then be tracked to see how it is progressing and status. The key is reporting it in the right way and to the right people and then checking the progress.

TO REPORT A FAULT YOURSELF:

1/ Anyone can access the on line KCC fault reporting page, and enter the details of the fault and its location. You search on the INTERNET "REPORT A ROAD FAULT TO KCC" Then select that page from the search results

2/ Review the page to ensure the fault falls within the remit of what you can report, then follow the "NEXT" command to record your fault and type. Note you may need details on location or any other information like post code to help locate the area of the fault.

3/ Having successfully entered the fault, the system will give you a FAULT REF NO. i.e. 123456. Keep a note of that number as you will need it to TRACK your fault.

4/ If you have a problem with submitting a fault yourself, please contact one of the HCA committee members, or trustees, and we will enter the details for you and record the fault ref no. to allow it to be tracked.

TO TRACK A FAULT YOURSELF:

1/ Access the KCC ONLINE web page by entering "TRACK A FAULT KENT COUNCTY COUNCIL".

2/ Then enter the FAULT REF NUMBER, for the fault and work you wish to track and the web page will show the fault update. I have shown the update reports for the 2 lights mentioned above below.

3/ Again if you have problems with that please contact an HCA committee member or trustee and we will be happy to assist. AGAIN THE FAULT REF NUMBER IS KEY HERE SO MAKE SURE IF YOU HAVE ENTERED THE FAULT YOU HAVE AREF NUMBER RECORDED

A little bit of background on why problems can occur.

The first issue is as always who will pay for it. Some things are paid for by the COUNTY COUNCIL and some are paid for by the Local Authority and in our case that is Canterbury City Council (CCC).

The second issue is the system for controlling and logging the work. Which can have issues and sometimes badly managed.

In the case of the street light faults mentioned, the fault is then reported to Canterbury City Council by KCC. Because it is CCC who have the responsibility for funding these repair works. When that funding is approved by CCC and approval passed back to KCC, then KCC will organise the work. In the light repairs case, KCC organise and approve UK POWER NETWORKS to carry out the work. Yes a bit of a long route but that is the way it works.

So why is that a problem, and it takes so long for these jobs to be carried out? Again the answer is money. CCC is currently in debt to approx. £180 million. They are currently paying approx. £12 million per year interest on that debt, or approx. £76 for every resident in Canterbury per year. How that has happened is not for this piece, but it hopefully explains why it can take so long for even the simplest of things to be done, if at all?

You will see in the attached as an example for tracking, the NEW HOUSE CLOSE light has been passed to the DISTRICT COUNCIL for approval i.e. CCC. So we wait and see how long it takes to approve the funding for that? The HCA light took nearly 2 years!!!! On that one the tracking info also attached shows it having been COMPLETED. KCC have given notice of a road closure in NEW HOUSE LANE in the next few weeks, and this would appear to be linked to the work on the HCA HALL LIGHT. So hopefully this light will finally be fixed

Systems are fine and we can help them work but in the present day and age the importance of using the system and of follow up cannot be over emphasised. At last then the fault is recorded and on the system.


